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Genesis of the Organisation

Chetna Vikas was founded in the year 1985 by a team of young social activists who were actively engaged in the Sampurna Kranti Movement of Loknayak Jaiprakash and joined together to form this organization for the consciousness, empowerment and overall development of the disadvantaged section of the society on the values of peace, justice and equity. Chetna Vikas is founded on the basis of Gandhian ideology as it pertains to the alleviation of human suffering and injustice and development of vulnerable people. The concept of SWARAJ and ANTYODAYA are leading values for the organizational strategic plan.

Development Partners of Chetna Vikas are Tribal and Economically backward section of the society, who are deprived of the developmental rights, the farmers who are living under subsistence farming and adversely affected by the agro environmental factors, persons with disabilities, the women and children who are deprived of their rights.

Vision:

Chetna Vikas envisions a progressive and sustainable rural India, where in all people live peacefully and with dignity, enjoying social, political and economic equality as well as the right to livelihood, freedom of expression, and equal opportunity for public participation.

Mission:

Chetna Vikas' mission is to empower the poor, disabled and disenfranchised in rural regions of Jharkhand State to achieve the Gandhian principle of "sarvodaya" (universal uplift). It employs rights based, people centred, grass root and participatory methods to eliminate socio economic inequality, promote health, nutrition and well being, facilitate self reliance, enable local self governance, ensure national resource management and promote people's advocacy.

Health : Child Survival

Neo natal mortality is defined as the probability of dying of new born in the first 28 days of delivery. The organisation is working in 155 villages of Saraiyahat block to ensure that new born children survive the critical first month of their lives. We are focusing on low cost community based methods as well as institution strengthening to reduce maternal, newborn and child deaths. Our programmes promote children's health care and seek to prevent common childhood illness in the first two years of their lives.

Our approach has been to enhance the capacity and role realization of three Frontline health workers - Auxiliary Nurse Midwife (ANM), Anganwadi workers (AWW) and Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHA) known as Sahiyas in Jharkhand who are effectively addressing our programmes. The convergence of three frontline health workers has resulted to increase number of Village Health Nutrition Day conducted as per the guidelines which includes Antenatal check up, Tetanus Toxide injection, distribution of 100 IFA tablets and counseling. As per the rooster 122 VHNDs are conducted per month out of which 67 VHNDs

are conducted as per the guidelines. Dropout rate of children is less as compared to children who has completed one year of age in primary immunization. 1652 children have been immunized in primary immunization which includes BCG, 3 doses of OPV & DPT, Hepatitis and Measles.

Sahiyas has been the backbone of this project and are proving to effective link between health facility and community through Janani Suraksha Yojana, Janani Shishu Suraksha Karyakarm and Navjat shishu Suraksha Karyakarm (NSSK). Institution delivery has increased to a considerable level in the period April 2013 - March 2014 1764 no of women delivered out of which 1308 women delivered at institution which includes Government and Private institution and 980 women received JSY benefits. NSSK is a programme initiated in 2011 on basic new born care and resuscitation to address important interventions of care at birth i.e. prevention of hypothermia, prevention of infection, early initiation of breastfeeding and basic new born resuscitation. Except new born resuscitation other important intervention of care at birth is addressed by Sahiyas through

six/seven schedule home visits as well as post natal check up of delivered women. Cumulative figures for the above mentioned period October 2013- March 2014 is 617 schedule visits has been done by Sahiyas out of 747 children who had completed 42 days of their birth. The visit has been progressed intensively from the month of October 2013 onwards.

Institution building has been done through the strengthening of Village Health Sanitation and Nutrition Committee; Mothers committee Women based Self Help Group and Panchayati Raj Institutions. Community based monitoring is done by PRI & VHSNC members through checklist on each VHND and advocate the issues with the concerned officials for streamlining the service delivery. Community



Mobilization on the need for appropriate behavior change among communities and increased demand based on the realization of their rights. Street play and community meeting has been done in the project villages to bring an attitudinal change among the community regarding the important issue of survival of new borns.

CASE STUDY: Bare Foot Doctor - Manju Devi

Manju Devi Age - 24 yrs Sahiya of Belidhab village in Dhouni Panchayat in Saraiyahat block of Dumka district. She is passionate to deliver her assigned duties. She is very active despite the odds she faced by family and near relatives in working on health and social issues in the village. The support she received from the team of Chetna Vikas in delivering the services to the community is truly laudable.



She regularly visits the pregnant women, advises the woman as per the needs and focuses on the new borns. She uses the kit delivered by the project during home visit as well as on VHND where she takes the weight of the new born and infant who are immunized and keeps the record in the register for her personal reference and monitors the growth.

She has initiated the six and seven home visit after the guidance from the project team and maintains the records. She has maintained symbiotic relationship with frontline health workers i.e. ANM & Sevika and ensures ANC is done to the pregnant women in her village. She is also regular in conducting VHSNC meeting. People have accepted her role as a bare foot doctor cum social health activist in the community.



Community Engagement in Effective Implementation of RSBY

To address the issue of out of pocket expenses on health and access to quality health care services by below poverty line families and other identified groups through Rashtriya Swasthya Bima Yojana (RSBY) is the significant government programme. Poorest Areas Civil Society Programme (PACS) has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with State Nodal Agency, JASLAWS (Jharkhand State Labour Welfare Department) for effective Implementation of RSBY in Jharkhand. The organization is working towards increasing the uptake in non-discriminatory access to RSBY by the socially excluded groups and BPL households in the eight earmarked districts namely Deoghar, Palamu, Bokaro, Giridih, West Singhbhum, Lohardaga, Gumla and Chatra.

There is a huge gap in the delivery and uptake of services by the rural poor. Thus, though it is important to improve the service delivery component, it is also crucial to mobilize people for better uptake of the services, and to hold the government machineries accountable. This can

be realized by organized intervention focusing at both the demand as well as the supply side so that the community level organizations, are aware of their entitlement to quality health services and that of the insurance scheme, and are capacitated to raise their demand for good quality services. It is in this regard that the role played by Chetna Vikas in partnership with its CSO partners (ASRA, EKJUT, GCK, LCSS, NSVK, PRERNA BHARTI, SMS, and SHARE) assumes greater significance.

Role of RSBY Mitras

- ❑ Carry out community awareness and sensitization on RSBY.
- ❑ Facilitate RSBY beneficiaries in utilizing services of the scheme.
- ❑ Initiate action and local advocacy for addressing grievances.
- ❑ Track and keep record on access of RSBY services in their village.



RSBY Mitra ~ Friends of RSBY

The concept of RSBY Mitra has been envisioned with the objective to create a community cadre on RSBY so as to strengthen communities and involve community members in monitoring of scheme. RSBY Mitra is envisaged as community level health worker who would voluntarily take up responsibility of reaching to the families for awareness about the scheme. At present the concept is being piloted in two districts of Jharkhand namely, West Singhbhum and Sahibganj and 400 RSBY Mitras have been selected from the two most backward districts of the state. RSBY Mitra is an active member of CBO who will be extensively trained on the entitlements of RSBY. There will be one RSBY mitra per 50 families. The selection of RSBY Mitra

started from May, 2013 after the issuance of the approval letter by SNA Jharkhand, JASLAWS. The formal launch of RSBY Mitras took place on 18th January, 2014 in West Singhbhum and on 10th February, 2014 in Sahibganj. Flip charts, posters and other IEC materials provided are being used to communicate on RSBY via one to one discussion during home visits,



Gram sabha meetings, religious meetings, and general village / panchayat level meetings. In the last 3-4 months, 355 cases of hospitalization have been done with the support of RSBY Mitras in West Singhbhum.



Education : Child Development

Chetna Vikas envision “a community where effective sponsor relations bring about positive change for children.” The project intervened and focused on enabling a scope of health activities into different age groups of children, in 27 Villages of Sariyhat block in Dumka district of Jharkhand. The organization's major concern is on enhancing knowledge and capacities of community on maternal & child health, promoting innovation, qualitative education and confidence building activities, focus on accessing quality education for 6-14 years children and promoting youth participation to create youth leaders for their own well being.

Healthy & Secure Infants (0 - 5 Years):

The First Life Cycle which is 0 - 5 Years, where we stress on Positive Deviance Hearth sessions in addressing the issues of nutrition, counseling session with pregnant lactating mother, development of knowledge level of care givers & service providers on positive infant/child care practices, promote early childhood development in the community and promoting institutional delivery. The output of our effort is

clearly seen in the community now the PLM groups are trained and aware about the maternal health and feeding practice. Four Early Childhood Development (ECD) Centers has been established where, there is no accessibility of ICDS centers and at present about 93 children are getting benefits through learning in play way methods at each ECD centers. Kitchen Garden has been promoted among the community and has increased the level of awareness on the benefits of nutrition to pregnant, lactating women and adolescent girls.



Educated & Confident Children (6 – 14 Years) :

The Second Life Cycle which is 6 – 14 Years has activities based on innovative & qualitative education and confidence building programs. The Organization is trying to streamline all 6-14 years children in accessing appropriate quality education in the project area. By enrolling in special coaching classes for needy and slow learner's students. About 80 % of the students have scored 'A' Grade in RIP (Reading Improvement Program). About 158 children are getting benefits and gradually their reading improvement skill has been improved.

Chetna Vikas is running a project title **Catalyzing Change through education of children in the age group of 3 - 16 yrs in 40 villages**. We focus on Anganwadi center and School of each village to create a positive impact in education sector. The objective of this project is to re-enroll school dropout students back in schools and empower community to track or monitor the right delivery of government programs related to early childhood care and primary education, thereby ensuring a progressive growth of literacy rate in the target area.

In pre-school intervention Mothers committee was capacitated regarding their role and responsibilities. They started being together and sharing their overview regarding their child's

development. In 22 villages Mother's committee meetings are being regularized. Training has been provided to AWWs on the innovative pedagogy, providing play and learning materials, attendance supervision of Anganwadi center all these helped to increase attendance in AWC. In 2011 in the age group of 3-6 yrs 657 children were enrolled in AWC and only 165 children were attending AWC. After our intervention 1079 children enrolled and 844 children regularly attended Anganwadi center till March 2014.

In 36 Schools focus is being given on strengthening the school system and support educational material for girl and reenrolled children. In this year we have supported 100 girl and poor children from target area.

Attendance supervision in school, door to door visit, counseling with parent and children has helped to increase the attendance in schools consistently. In 2013-14 the cumulatively figure reflects 2402 children are being regular in school out of 3402 enrolled children. 371 drop out students were identified in 2011 and 265 children have been re enrolled till March 2014.

Others activities like National Day celebration, Learning level assessment of children, Capacity Building of Bal Sansad , Co-curricular Activities like painting competition, drawing Competition hand writing competition, cultural program are being done regularly to sustain their interest and hone their skills.

The participation of PRIs, Teachers and Government departments for sharing present situation of education to create positive impacts in schools. SMC members participate in addressing child centric development issues. In 36 schools 22 SMC groups conduct their meeting regularly in a year with active participation of 12-14 members.





The organization is implementing the **Project Our Children Our Rights** in 20 tribal dominated villages of five panchayats in Saraiyhat Block of Dumka District on the issue to promote quality education to the children in the age group of 6-14 yrs. The main objectives are to regularize the children between the age group of 6-14 years in schools, enroll these children in age appropriate classes, regularize them in schools and create awareness among the community people about the importance of education.

The following activities have been undertaken to bring development changes among the children. Academic evaluation was conducted in 20 villages with the aim to assess the progress on different subjects - Hindi and Mathematics which will help us to assess a plan accordingly to help the children to improve their academic performance. Coaching classes are regularly carried in each village to provide supplementary support to the children who are slow learners, drop-outs and irregular children to schools. A total of 678 children are enrolled in these coaching centers and have performed well in their academics. 416 children are now able to read and comprehend their text books and are able to solve arithmetic. Co curricular activities and celebration of national days have been done to inculcate the spirit of patriotism to bring out



inherent qualities of the children.

Community awareness through street play on the importance of education has helped to bring out the consciousness among the villagers on providing an equal treatment to girls and boys. Teaching Learning Materials are distributed in 20 schools to make the teaching process more joyful and interactive among the children. Indoor sports materials were provided in these 20 schools to promote the physical and mental development of the children and reduce the rates of children being irregular in their schools after the midday meal session.

Regular meetings were conducted every month in 20 Bal Sansads to help the members to identify their roles and responsibilities in these schools. Regular meetings have helped the children to have details knowledge about the functioning of the Bal Sansads in these schools. Out of these 20 Bal Sansads, 12 Bal Sansads members have been able to regularize their meetings.

Community meetings are organized with the objectives to develop the interest and importance of education among the community. This initiation would not only help to create awareness among the community but would also enable the parents to identify their responsibilities towards their children and help them to grow their children as better citizens of India.





Child Protection : Ending Child Marriage

Chetna Vikas is implementing a project titled, “Empowering Girls by Addressing Child Marriage” in 15 villages of three panchayats of Mohanpur and Deoghar Block. The Project objectives are -

- ❑ To ensure that the girls and women are aware and informed of their legal rights
- ❑ To work towards creating an enabling environment for ensuring that the policy and laws serve as effective tools to prevent and protect girls from becoming the victims of child marriage.
- ❑ To mobilize and involve the community in order to bring in attitudinal and mind set change.

The intervention work is in progress at three levels - Village Level Awareness and mechanism to prevent Child Marriage, District and Block Level awareness and Strategy Planning and Advocacy at State Level.

Total 45 youths in the age group of 14-24 are members of task force in 15 villages of intervention area to create awareness among villagers regarding the negative effects of Child marriage. They were trained and capacitated through various orientation programs, through

exposure visit in different districts of Hazaribag and Ranchi regarding the status of Child Marriage. In 2013-14 Child marriages were reported by the Task Force members out of which 2 child marriage were prevented by the members in the intervention area. Strategy was decided that Panchayat will start a tracking register regarding Child and will ensure their role to prevent Child marriage. In 4 villages of Shankari Panchyat Resource Hub is running to ensure participation of girl child in various activities. In these centre children are coming in regular basis and task force member also trying to be part of it. Regular sports activity was done by children with that different kind of discussion was going on with children regarding gender perspective as well as on child protection issues.

District Level Sensitization with Media and Civil society has helped to create strategy to prevent Child Marriage in villages. We were part of a National Level Campaign on “33% Women Reservation Bill in the national parliament and state legislature.”

A rally was organised addressing this issue regarding rights of “Girl Child” was highlighted.

Sahiya (health worker at village level) plays an important role to create awareness among the villagers regarding Child Marriage. Pre and post natal health hazards are very obvious for a young girl who is below 18. Two Block level orientation were organized at Mohanpur and Deoghar with Sahiyas on cause and effect of Child Marriage and their role to prevent it.

One of the major progresses of the project was to collaborate with govt. officials and policy makers regarding the status of implementation of Prohibition of Child Marriage Act (PCMA) in Jharkhand. Two State Level Consultation on Child Marriage with various government department and civil society organisations were organized to focus on strengthening the implementation of PCMA. A strategic partnership with National Mission for Empowerment of Women (NMEW) was intended to enable state-level government functionaries and nodal agencies like Integrated Child Protection Scheme's functionaries, Department of Social Welfare, Women Commission, Media, NGOs to be part of this collaborative platform and facilitating convergence amongst different Ministries to effectively address issues of Child marriage in Jharkhand.

The organization is implementing a project titled **Bal Maitri - Towards Child Friendly Jharkhand** on Child Protection issues in four district of Jharkhand - Deoghar, Giridih, Dhanbad & Sahebganj. In 2013 the piloting phase it is working in four Panchayat of these districts to development of Community based Child Protection Mechanism (CBCPM), District level system strengthening, State level Advocacy & system strengthening in the framework of Integrated Child Protection Scheme and collaboration with State Child Protection Society and Department of Women and Child Development.

In the 31 villages, the Village Child Protection Committee members, Peer educators were trained through different trainings. The Child Protection Information Centers has strengthen the Community Based Child protection Mechanism is to protect the children from the four issues of child protection i.e. exploitation, violence, abuse, and neglect. The aim of the mechanism to provide the children a protective environment and helps them to develop and live a better life. Through conducting meetings, creating awareness on child rights and protection, this initiation is trying to ensure that no child falls out of the safety net of the society.

Capacity Building of Women, Panchayat Level functionaries' was done regarding their role and responsibility in sync with Child Rights and Protection which gave them perspective to work on children issues at Panchayat Level. District Need Assessment was done in four districts block level assessment at Dhanbad and Giridih district to identify the prevalence of Child Marriage, Child trafficking, Child Labour with the stakeholders to assess the status of children regarding child protection issues, with the help of district child protection society.

In 29 schools of the project area an initiative of celebrating child rights week was done from 14th Nov-20th Nov 2013 was celebrated through Bal Sansad and Bal Panchayat. It helped to strengthen the Bal Sansad at each schools, and Panchayats to be more active in the child rights initiation.

Media sensitization, orientation of civil society, providing training and assistance of police to handle child protection issues, initiative with magic bus to create strategy to handle Child Protection cases focusing on children conflict with law, mass awareness on child sexual abuse through mobile radio were other initiatives in State and District level to create a virtuous impact on Child Protection perspective.



Livelihood : Towards Inclusive Development

The organisation has taken innovative approach in the field of small Orchard concept to promote livelihood options among tribal people. Under this project 78 acres of land is being used for small orchard and 35 acres are used for intercropping purpose in eight villages of Saraiyahat Block of Dumka District.

Since 2011 the organisation is supporting a government Flag ship program MGNREGA (Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Grantee Act) for improving lives of women and people with disabilities in ensuring 100 days of work. The organization is the lead civil society organization and working with 23 Civil Society Network partners to ensuring jobs and others benefits of 448 villages of Dumka and Deoghar District. In this phase of implementation Chetna Vikas has gained recognition as a technical expertise in the field of MGNREGA, RSBY (Rashtriya Swasth Bima Yojana) & working for the rights of disadvantaged groups and to better deal with the issues of discrimination as well as advocate the issues of socially excluded communities in operational area. A member from the organization has been appointed as state level trainer on gender issue. Organization's visibility & acceptance has been

developed at panchayat level, Mukhiya has started taking the assistance of organization in MGNREGA, Social Welfare Programs like- Sanitation, Health Awareness, Toilet construction, Opening bank accounts in jan-dhan scheme etc. Four thousand nine (4009) MGNREGA labours have received work under Kam Mango Abhiyan and 450 labours have shown active participation in Mazdoor Samelan and CBO conclave, and spread comprehensive awareness program in 136 villages that resulted awareness regarding MGNREGA rules and regulations.

Apart from that 60 % of the Women and PWDs (People with Disability) increased their participation in Gram Sabha and other forms of Local Self Government, 70 % of the households (40061 families) of socially excluded groups having 100 days of employment under MGNREGA in the targeted area. 353 women started receiving widow pension this year onwards Training and Capacity Building among members make them Change Agent of the Society. The network has played a influential role in creating a positive and fearless environment for Jan Sunwai and Social Audit in project area.

The organisation initiated a program for advocating the National Food Security Scheme for implementation of the Act in the state of Jharkhand. Two district level workshops on Right to Food at Dumka and Deoghar created awareness among the prevailing food security situation in the state.

It had organized a regional meet advocating the ROZI ROTI ADHIKAR AND BHOJAN KA ADHIKAR ABHIYAN under the Right to Food Bill. This created a pressure on the government and a district to state and finally to the national level to promote proper implementation of the Right to Food. This led to the sanctioning of the Food Security Bill. A state level advocacy named as JANWAKALAT on food security bill, National Food Security Bill had been sanctioned. The major issues which were discussed were to re-validate the list of BPL, ICDS and Public Distribution System for the proper implementation of NFSA, ensuring the coverage including every single woman and also persons with disabilities.

As a part of the program implementation GARD (Gram AaharRaksha Dal) a monitoring agency at village level which monitors the proper implementation of the social security



schemes has been working to ensure proper implementation of the recent social security schemes, its process and availability in their respective panchayats. As a result of the implementation a total of 31 disabled persons got the certificate through the intervention of GARD where 9 PWD gave application to CDPO for their pension scheme. 16 Persons with disability gave application for Job Card to Rojgar Sevak where 10 of them received it.

As a result of extensive campaign at state level advocating for NFSA to reach out to 5,000 villages for universalization of ICDS services. Awareness among the teachers about MDM provisions, inclusion of AAY beneficiaries as defined Supreme Court guideline, responsibility for distribution of grains at PDS should be given to SHG. Focusing on developing accountability and transparency in the system at every level was focused.

Continuous advocacy both at state and district level helped to consolidate the gains of people's campaigns on issues of survival and build broad alliances in preparation to ensure the centrality of eliminating hunger, the right to food and livelihood, and social protection as a political.





Disability: Change Towards Life

JHARKHAND INCLUSIVE EDUCATION PROJECT: "Our continuous efforts towards developing quality elementary education for students with disabilities in Dumka district"

Jharkhand Inclusive Education Project supported has taken a twin track approach to strengthen the inclusive education efforts of the State Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan. In one track, the organisation is implementing the project at district level covering 377 visually impaired students. The project at the district level has undertaken clinical and functional assessment of all the 508 blind and low vision children identified under the survey. The VI children are dispensed with low vision devices and other assistive materials towards their quality education. 71 low-vision devices, 25 white canes have been distributed in the project area. Large print text books, braille books, Braille kits, brailler, etc have been distributed to the children for their quality education. Apart from those new technologies like 26 daisy players, 12 Brailleurs have been provided to the children to enhance their learning level. The project has ensured the provision of teaching and learning materials and teacher guides as well as provided sports materials to schools and SSA block resource centres.

On the other hand Chetna Vikas under the project has led special emphasis on teacher training, institution strengthening and leadership development in the field of inclusive education. The project has shared the evidence base from the demonstration field with the state authorities. This has helped the Jharkhand Project Council to adapt to some of the good approaches to inclusive education emanating from the demonstration project. The state level officials are also taken to the demonstration field for their exposure and learning. In the two years of project implementation the project has been recognized by the State Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan as a resource initiative to supplement the efforts of the SSA in the field of education of visually impaired children.



All the 10 blocks of Dumka district are covered under the project. The district-wise survey identified a total of 508 children in the age group of 0 to 16 years in 206 panchayats. Since the inception of Jharkhand Inclusive Education project, Chetna Vikas has taken up keen interest to cater and fulfill the following needs of the student with Visual Impairment:

- ❑ Opportunity to form social relationships within the school and wider community;
- ❑ Initiative to take risks that enable growth;
- ❑ Awareness of personal strength, talent, learning styles and interests;
- ❑ Opportunities for pragmatic and

supplementary learning;

- ❑ Inclusion in the mainstream;
- ❑ Opportunities to develop goals, dreams and aspirations;
- ❑ Feel safe and comfortable;
- ❑ Provided appropriate materials and adaptive equipments to maximize learning;
- ❑ Development of positive self-esteem;
- ❑ Have the same rights and responsibilities as other students;
- ❑ Taking a step towards being independent and resourceful;
- ❑ Strengthening towards advocacy.

Case Study – “Abdul sees a bright future”

Abdul Razzaq 10 years old is total blind residing in Amba village of Sadra panchayat from Jarmundi block of Dumka District. He lives in a family of 5 members and has 2 brothers and a sister. Abdul was totally confined to his home. He was totally dependent on his family for doing his daily chore activities. He was not admitted to school and his parents were also not much inclined in sending him to school sighting his blindness. Due to Abdul remaining confined in house he did not have any friends neither did he know anyone outside his house. He was very reluctant to even meet IE facilitator during the initial days of the project.

After work started, Abdul's parents were first given full information about the project. They were given the confidence that their child also deserves a better and normal life and also they were requested to support the IE facilitators. Abdul was admitted to the local school. At home IE facilitator was giving hands on training on daily living skills, orientation and mobility, basics of elementary education and use of Braille in writing.

According to Abdul writing in Braille is challenging as he was unable to concentrate for a constant period of time.

Abdul is now going regularly to school by himself; he sits at the front of the class. The school teacher is also very supportive and ensures that Abdul is regular to school. Now he is able to read and write in Braille. He can read and write A to Z in Braille. After he started going to school, he has made many friends. He is no more hesitant to meet new people.

He has gained confidence and is no more dependent on his family members and thanked his near and dear ones for all the support and guidance that has been provided to him.





Jharkhand Social Inclusion Project

“Efforts towards enhancing quality of life for disabled people of Jarmundi block of Dumka district”

In order to enhance the quality of life through the quality & quantity of services and to promote individual autonomy, respect and dignity in the life of persons with disabilities on par with the national & international development such as UNCRPD, Chetna Vikas has been implementing Jharkhand Social Inclusion project in Jarmundi block of Dumka District. It has taken up initiative for the empowerment of persons with disabilities and thereby improving their quality of life. It has been utilizing the philosophy of psychosocial, physical, mental, educational, economical, cultural and spiritual development through the concept of community based rehabilitation and ensuring their social acceptance, dignity and sense of belongingness. Under the evolved project, it has been implementing the various services such as Skill Development camps, capacity building program for the DPO (Disabled People's Organisation), formation of village level SHGs of the disabled, community meetings, district level consultation workshops, Orientation and mobility training to the

blind/low-vision, economic rehabilitation etc. The objective of the project is to develop and demonstrate initiatives that improve the capacities and opportunities for the disabled people to participate in community life. Ensuring the social security schemes of the government, strengthening through income generation program, empowerment of Disabled People's Organization and other favorable policies will help in realization of their rights. 30 SHGs have been created under the project and have been linked with the banks. 12 PWDs have been supported to start their own business. 15 PWDs have been provided training and are now successfully doing jobs. Many more vocational and livelihood trainings will be organized in the future to benefit the PWDs.





Case Study - Mohar Mohli "Conquering Disability"

Mohar Mohli aged 34 years, a resident of village Khatigare, Jhanakpur panchayat is supported by his wife Dayawati Devi, 29 years of age and two children. Both Mohar and his wife and one of his child Vikas is physically handicapped. Both have medical certificates and they are receiving pension. During the survey Mohar Mohli and his family members were identified. During that time the income sources of the family was very limited and not very regular. He used to work making baskets and other items of bamboo, the income was not sufficient to support his family. The cluster coordinator started guiding Mohar so that he could improve his income sources. The Cluster Coordinator facilitated in making SHG of the disabled people in the village consisting of 10 people of which Mohar was also a member. With the SHG's help, medical certificate was made of his child Vikas Mohli. Bank account has been opened of the SHG; the SHG conducts regular monthly meetings where discussions take place on various topics. The cluster coordinator guided Mohar Mohli in applying for Indira Awas Yojna which he received and used the amount in making house.

Mohar Mohli's income source is working with bamboo and making baskets of different sizes. Due to lack of money he was unable to invest more in buying the basic requirements for expanding his business. At this point he was provided with Rs. 3000 as a loan by the organisation for the purpose of buying raw materials for his business. He bought the materials required for expanding the business and along with his wife started making many items of bamboo and selling them in the village markets. He is now able to earn around Rs 300 per day by selling such items. He is also thinking of investing more in buying raw materials and cutting equipments which will help him in expanding production. He is now self-confident and has developed a positive attitude towards life and is confident enough towards increasing his business.

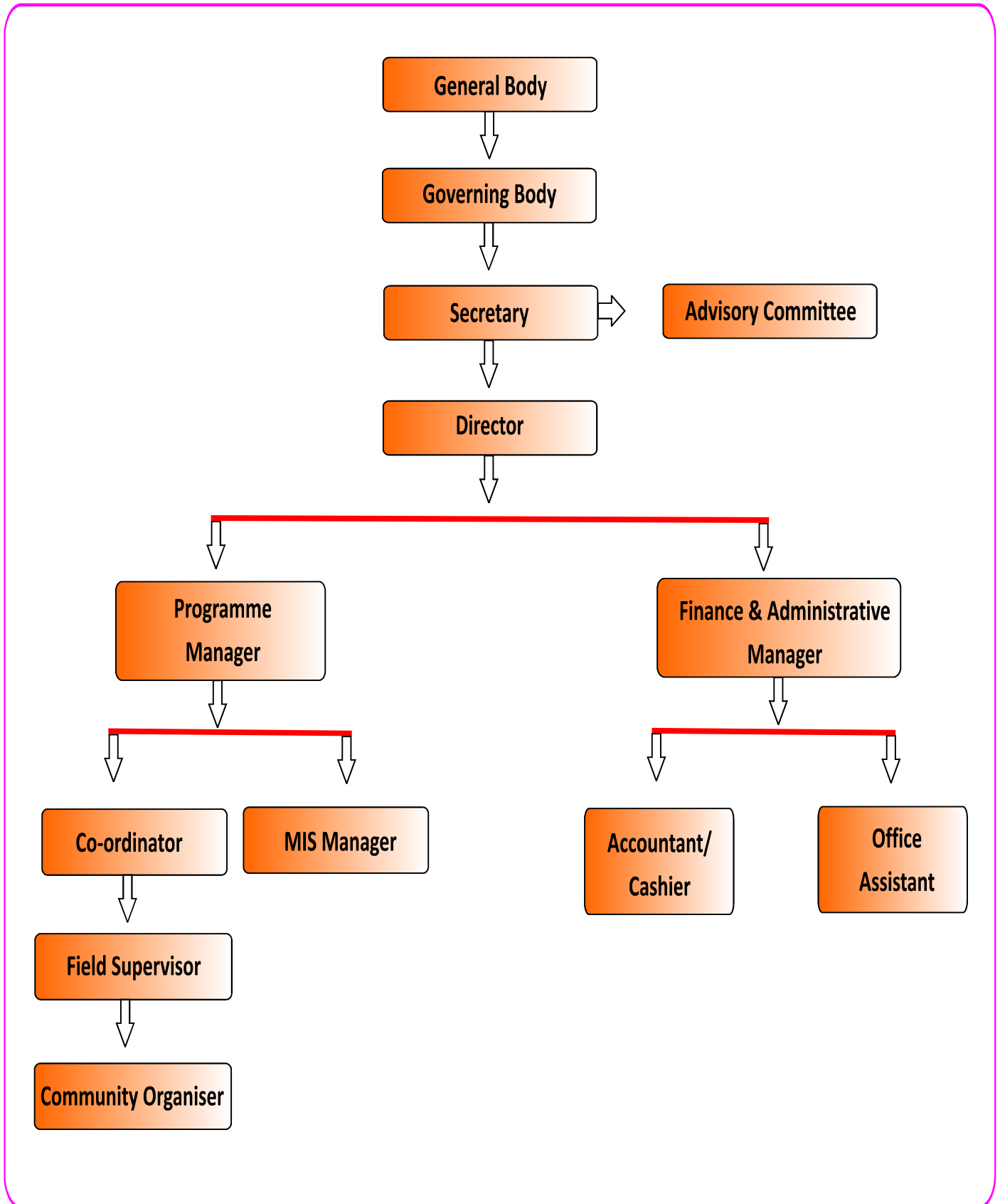
