

Our Strategy


Developing a process of empowerment following a right based approach towards bringing the marginalized and vulnerable into mainstream of Society.

Livelihood promotion with Youth and PWD's



Chetna Vikas has started this initiative to engage the PWD's in livelihood generation activities. Thus they are being trained on various trade mostly on the locally available resources where the capital investment seems to be low. The objective is to develop and demonstrate initiatives that improve the capacities and opportunities for the disabled people to participate in community life. Ensuring the social security schemes of the government, strengthening through income generation program, empowerment of Disabled People's Organization and other favorable policies will help in realization of their rights and entitlements and a barrier free environment for PWDs.

Empowering girl's through sports ... *preventing early marriage*



Our efforts have been made towards empowering girls with enabling support system which can resist and prevent early marriages with the help of sports. Through football, Unmukt provides the girls exposure, peer networking and helped in building their confidence and develop their leadership skills. The girls also are provided need based support. To provide overall aid of the community the boys group is also trained on the gender discrimination issues and how they will be able to prevent early marriage and are also motivated to build a gender friendly community.

17 Child marriages were stopped by the collective efforts of the girls, VLCPC, SMC.

10 VLCPC members are made active and regular in organizing meetings and tracking of children.

125 Girls who were weak in education & drop out were main streamed and have been given coaching on Mathematics, science and English and they have started attending school regularly and their academics have improved.

The Girls from the community were invited from Doordarshan, Ranchi for to share their stories of change.


